New KOIN Advisory Panel to Assist Network

The Cabinet for Health and Family Services/Kentucky Department for Public Health (CHFS/DPH) has appointed a group of seasoned, active KOIN members to become the first KOIN Advisory Panel.

Panelists will share specialized advice and consultation about the communication needs of hard-to-reach Kentuckians and provide input and consultation on strategies and activities for expanding and strengthening the KOIN. They will also serve as an information conduit from the grassroots level to the state and assist CHFS/DPH in accurately understanding the challenges faced by KOIN members and the resources they need as they reach out to Kentucky's diverse at-risk populations.

In its first meeting, the panel identified lessons learned from the H1N1 (swine flu) campaign, resulting in changes in how KOIN alerts will be formatted. Panelists will convene by phone in August to discuss lessons learned from the May floods as well as look ahead to the upcoming fall flu season.

Workshop Members Energized to Expand KOIN

"Ah-ha" moments fired up KOIN members who attended the "Building KOIN Capacity" workshops in May. Energized participants provided much useful information to the organizers, and in turn, learned more about their roles in relaying information to vulnerable populations in emergencies.

During the workshops, participants suggested refining the format of KOIN alerts to make required actions clearer. After the workshops, the network was activated due to flooding in Kentucky. The KOIN alert was issued in a new format that incorporated members' suggestions from the workshop. Workshop attendees received updates on KOIN progress, including formation of the KOIN Advisory Panel, KOIN recruitment efforts, KOIN database update process, results of surveys and development of picture-based fact sheets about carbon monoxide poisoning and winter safety for limited English proficient populations. The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services/ Department for Public Health (CHFS/DPH) conducted the workshops in collaboration with Jane Mobley Associates on May 4-5, 2010, in Frankfort and Bowling Green, Ky. Participants represented a diverse range of government

agencies, community-based and faithbased organizations, service providers and at-risk population groups.

KOIN Survey Results

KOIN members provided valuable feedback to CHFS/DPH through the 2010 KOIN Survey of Communication Technology and Capabilities. The survey, which was administered online, generated 86 responses. This was a 48 percent increase in analyzed surveys from 2009.

FAST FACTS

- 36% of respondents used web-enabled smartphones at work.
- 31% of respondents used social media for work purposes.
- 27% reported their employer was considering policy changes to allow the use of social media for work purposes.
- 31% of respondents indicated a lack of clarity about whether their employer expects them to be available to receive and transmit KOIN alerts after hours, on weekends and holidays.
- Only 10% of respondents reported having <u>no</u> backup power source for their preferred communication device in the event of an electrical outage.

Talking With a KOIN Member....Jean Caudill

Jean Caudill stands out as a KOIN member whose leadership has strengthened the KOIN at the local and regional levels. Jean, who is the disaster preparedness coordinator for the Northern Kentucky District Health Department, joined the KOIN in 2008. After attending the 2008 KOIN Workshop, Jean realized that her region's membership in the network was low. She decided to create a local communication network of public sector and community-based organizations to reach at-risk populations with public health and emergency information, including KOIN alerts. Jean's efforts resulted in an e-mail distribution list of nearly 100 contacts and 25 new KOIN members.

Jean initiated the following steps to create a local network. Her steps can be replicated by others.

1. Lay the foundation.

Jean first contacted Barbara Fox, KOIN coordinator, to find out how many KOIN members were in the Northern Kentucky region. She then talked with her supervisors to obtain their support to tell more people about the KOIN. She also talked to the local health care planning coalition (HPC) to get buy-in and commitment to share grant funding. Jean emphasized that her efforts could help the HPC meet some of its goals, too.

2. Reach out.

Recognizing the demands of busy schedules, Jean kept it simple. She e-mailed supervisors and directors of other health departments, requesting community-level contacts who would understand the need for a local network. This e-mail solicitation brought in almost 100 names for potential membership in the KOIN and the local network.

3. Bring people together.

Jean used HPC support to schedule an outreach luncheon. She kept the meeting short and provided a succinct overview of the KOIN and her interest in forming a local network. Jean said the **KOIN Video and User's Guide** made her presentation easy because the information was already organized. Although not everyone joined the KOIN, some agreed to provide their contact information for the local network.

4. Share notes to help assure progress.

Jean documented the meeting and collected contacts in multiple ways. She included the information in an annex to the HPC's regional plan. She shared the contact list, meeting notes and other information in a central file for her colleagues. She also uses Google Docs to share information and files with regional network members; it notifies users when information is posted.

5. Think ahead to the next step.

In planning the next meeting for the local network, Jean's goal is to find topics of interest to network members, such as resiliency planning. She is also conducting research to identify at-risk populations using existing data and GIS mapping. Jean anticipates that the local group will only meet once per year, staying connected digitally between meetings.
