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KOIN/KYFNC ITV Workshop Recap—Oct. 22, 2014

The 2014 annual Kentucky Outreach and Information Network/ Functional Needs Collaborative (KOIN/KYFNC) Interactive Television (ITV) workshop was held on Oct. 22, 2014. It was broadcasted to 49 local health department ITV sites that signed up to participate with a total of 125 workshop participants. The ITV format allowed KOIN/ KYFNC members located throughout the state to meet regionally at their local health departments to utilize the ITV technology and reduce the need to travel long distances for the annual meeting. It also allowed them to become better acquainted and form working relationships in the event they need to work together when disasters strike.

The workshop featured presentations on the Chronic Disease Resource Manual for Disaster Preparedness; an overview of the Kentucky Community Crisis Response Board; Kentucky Programs for the Elderly during Emergencies and Disasters,;Medical Countermeasures for Community Preparedness; and an update on the KOIN and KYFNC. Workshop participants received a packet of KOIN/KYFNC materials.

Updated Federal Access and Functional Needs Guidance

The Guidance on Integrating People with Access and Functional Needs into Disaster Preparedness Planning for States and Local Governments is available at http:// www.phe.gov/ Preparedness/planning/ abc/Pages/afnguidance.aspx.

This updated guidance will introduce and connect you to available resources and inclusive strategies for integrating access and functional needs of at-risk individuals into emergency preparedness, response and recovery planning at all jurisdictional levels. Barbara Fox, KOIN Coordinator, worked closely with U.S. Health and Human Services (HHS) officials to provide guidance and valuable input to this project. The KOIN is listed as a Promising Practice for communicating with Access and Functional Needs under the Promising Practices section of the website. The Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention (CDC) workbook for Defining, Locating and Reaching Vulnerable Populations, based off of the KOIN, is also listed as a guidance resource.

In addition, both the KOIN and KYFNC were highlighted in a federal webinar discussing successful programs for access and functional needs populations.

State Program Gives the Gift of Hearing

The Kentucky Assistive Technology Service (KATS) Network's Statewide Hearing Aid Assistance and Reuse Program (SHARP) is a program that provides financial assistance to individuals to help cover the cost of the application fee for Hear Now to obtain hearing aids. Hear Now is an application-based program that provides hearing assistance to low-income Americans by fitting them with new, top-of-the-line digital hearing aids that are customized to their specific hearing loss.

The program encourages individuals to pay as much as they can afford towards the application fee, with SHARP providing financial assistance towards the remaining balance of the application fee for Hear Now. For individuals who do not qualify for Hear Now, SHARP in collaboration with Starkey Hearing Technologies All-Make Repair program, can provide financial assistance towards the cost of reconditional hearing aids that are available through the Starkey All-Make Repair Program. This reconditioning program carries hearing aids from all of the major manufacturers. The SHARP's refurbishing program is dependent on donated hearing aids. If you have any hearing aids to donate, please contact the KATS Network at (800) 327-5287 to request a selfaddressed stamped mailer, or you can drop off your used hearing aids at one of the participating collection centers.

Join the National Preparedness Community

The National Preparedness Community website located at http://www.community.fema.gov/connect.ti/readynpm is where you can connect and collaborate on emergency preparedness. It was initially designed to learn from each other and share resources, to connect with each other and emergency management personnel and to coordinate, participate in and engage others in preparedness activities.

Use it to empower yourself to prepare and to coordinate preparedness activities with their family, neighbors, co-workers and those with whom you may study or worship. Individuals can contribute what they can about what they know; ask for what they need; keep doing what is working; communicate about what is not working, and when possible, offer suggestions towards solutions. When people are connected and collaborate, they are more effective and efficient at educating and empowering them to prepare for disasters and emergencies.

The site features sections on preparedness resources, regional groups, communities of practice, preparedness discussions, national announcements and community evaluation surveys.

Radio Eye - Your Eye on the Written World

Radio Eye, Inc. is a volunteer-based Radio Reading Service in Lexington, Kentucky. It has been in continuous operation since it was founded in 1990 by Dr. Alfred Crabb. Radio Eye broadcasts live and recorded readings of newspapers and other printed material to people who are blind, visually impaired, or physically handicapped or those with reading problems due to the natural aging process, surgery or injury.

The service is provided free of charge, and the closed-circuit radio broadcast can be heard in 27 counties in Central Kentucky and the Greater Louisville Area 24 hours a day, every day throughout the year. Listeners tune in on a Sub-Carrier Authorization (SCA) radio, which is loaned to eligible individuals free of charge.

Each day, Radio Eye airs locally produced programming in which volunteers read state, regional and national newspapers including the *Lexington Herald-Leader* and the *Louisville Courier-Journal*. Listeners can also hear locally produced programming of readings from a variety of magazines and health periodicals.

On March 11, 2002, Radio Eye began broadcasting the reading of the *Lexington Herald-Leader* and other morning programming on Library Channel 20 on Lexington Insight Cable TV. This audio broadcast is intended for use by individuals who have difficulties reading but is available to anyone with Lexington Insight Communications Cable TV service by tuning into Channel 20 Monday through Saturday, 8-10 a.m., and Sunday from 9-11a.m. Earlier this year, Frankfort Cable began broadcasting the 24-hour program on Channel 2.

Eye on Kentucky Tip Line to Report Suspicious Activity

Eye on Kentucky is an anonymous telephone tip line that allows Kentuckians to report any suspicious criminal or terrorist activity that is observed or heard. The tip line is sponsored by the Kentucky Office of Homeland Security and Kentucky Intelligence Fusion Center.

The tip line is **1-866-EYE-ON-KY (1-866-393-6659)**. Citizens can also report suspicious activity regarding homeland security or crime online at http://homelandsecurity.ky.gov/sar. There is also a Smartphone app called Eyes and Ears on Kentucky to report suspicious activity or items.

Suspicious activity may include persons:

- asking unusual questions about building security;
- taking photographs or videos of buildings, bridges or other locations;
- asking detailed questions about the schedules of public transportation;
- observed timing the arrival and departure of public transportation;
- loitering around reservoirs, water treatment plants, dams or power generating plants;
- watching a building for extended periods of time.

Citizens should also be aware of suspicious vehicles parked in unusual places or at unusual times.

In cases of emergency, individuals should call 911 or local law enforcement.
